SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Rose Philippine

Duchesne. November 18

Born in 1769 into a wealthy French family, Rose Philippine Duchesne died in colonial Missouri, USA, in 1852. She entered a convent at age 19, despite her parents' opposition but returned home when the French Revolution expelled all the nuns. With a strong and dauntless will, she



cared for prisoners, the poor and sick, and risked her life helping underground priests. In 1804 Rose and some others joined the new Society of the Sacred Heart through which she hoped to become a missionary to the American Indians. Finally in 1818 Rose and five other sisters spent 11 weeks sailing across the Atlantic and 7 more weeks on the Mississippi River. They finally settled in a log cabin near St. Louis, Missouri. The little community suffered with language, culture, poverty, ignorance, forest fires, weather and slander, but within ten years they opened six houses and several schools. Rose founded the first free school for girls west of the Mississippi and the first Catholic Native American school. At her last mission at Sugar Creek, Kansas, Rose was an exhausted 72 years old. While others worked, she prayed. Legend has it that the Native American children would sneak up behind her as she knelt and prayed and sprinkle little bits of paper on her habit. Hours later they would come back to find the paper bits undisturbed. The Potawatomie tribe named her "Woman-Who-Prays-Always." Said St. Rose Philippine Duchesne, "He who has Jesus has everything."

THE CHURCH MILITANT, SUFFERING & TRIUMPHANT? Theologians have long taught that the Church, the Mystical Body of Christ, has three states: militant, suffering, and triumphant. If you are reading this, you are part of the church militant. We think of soldiers in uniform, in trenches, in peril. In our world today we are surrounded by violence and attacks on our faith and families. We must fight for our faith, our church and for the life of our soul. Some souls are not prepared at the time of death to join with God, not because he is angry or vengeful, but because we must be purified of sin in order to stand in front of his awesome glory. Many souls must be cleansed after death, even as bodies must be cleansed during life. "But nothing unclean shall enter" heaven (REV 21:27). And so the purging of our souls is completed in the suffering of purgatory. The church triumphant consists of saints, those known to us as canonized by the Church and those known only to God. This should be the goal of every Christian—to have lived a worthy life so that when it comes to its earthly end or after its sojourn in purgatory, we too may stand in front of God with a soul as pure as it was the day we were baptized.
