SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Catherine Laboure

Mar. 28 Memorial

It was an age of unbelief and hostility to religion. France was recovering from its Reign of Terror (1792-94) in which over 16,500 "enemies of the Revolution" were killed and religious communities were decimated. A mere 36 years



later, one of the few Daughters of Charity, Catherine Laboure. received a heavenly vision of Mary, the Mother of Jesus. During the apparition Catherine was instructed to have a medal made depicting Mary with hands outstretched, light streaming from her fingers representing the graces to be given to all who ask for them. The words, "O Mary, conceived without sin, pray for us who have recourse to thee," framed Mary. It took 24-year-old Catherine two years to convince her confessor by her holiness, sincerity and many prophesies fulfilled that her visions were legitimate. He received permission to produce 2,000 of the Medals of the Immaculate Conception, as it was originally called. Almost immediately miraculous healings, cures and conversions occurred. The medal quickly spread throughout France and then the world. Soon people were calling it the Miraculous Medal. Between 1832 and 1836 over two million medals were distributed. The medal helped pave the way for the proclamation of the dogma of the Immaculate Conception in 1854. Meanwhile, Catherine served in a men's hospice. She cooked, did laundry, nursed the sick and comforted the dying-all with such compassion that she was accused of being much too kind. Finally, two years before her death in 1876, Catherine revealed that she had been the recipient of the miraculous message from Mary 46 years earlier.

WHAT IS THE FIRST SATURDAY DEVOTION? On December 10, 1925, Our Lady appeared to Sister Lucia of Fatima, saying, "Have pity on the Heart of your Most Holy Mother. It is covered with thorns with which ungrateful men pierce it at every moment, and there is no one to remove them with an act of reparation." Detailing how devotion to her Immaculate Heart could be practiced, the most Holy Virgin said: "Look, my daughter, at my Heart... You at least try to console me, and say that I promise to assist at the hour of death, with the graces necessary for salvation, all those who, on the first Saturday of five consecutive months, shall confess, receive Holy Communion, recite five decades of the Rosary, and keep me company for fifteen minutes while meditating on the fifteen mysteries of the Rosary, with the intention of making reparation to me." The five Saturdays represent the five types of offences and blasphemies committed against the Immaculate Heart of Mary such as against her Immaculate Conception, her Perpetual Virginity, her Divine Maternity, and scorn or hatred against her and against her holy images. The elements of this devotion consist in following the four points offered in reparation to the Immaculate Heart of Mary. 1) Confession can be within a week of the Saturday. 2) Holy Communion can be on the Saturday or, with a priest's permission, on the following Sunday. 3) The Rosary must be offered in reparation and while reflecting on each mystery. 4) Meditation may embrace one or all of the Rosary's mysteries. It is important that the desire to console Our Lady's Immaculate Heart by making reparation and growing in holiness be the main motivation for this practice. See www.mdrevelation.org/rosary
