SAINTS OF THE WEEK

Berard, Peter, Adjute,

Accurs, & Odo, Jan. 16

In 1219, with the blessing of St. Francis, five friars left Italy to preach to the Moors. They were Berard,



Peter, Adjute, Accurs and Odo. They tried preaching in Seville, then in Muslim hands, but made no converts. They went on to Morocco where they preached in the marketplace. The friars were immediately apprehended and ordered to leave the country; they refused. When they began preaching again, an exasperated sultan ordered them executed. After enduring severe beatings and declining various bribes to renounce their faith in Jesus Christ, the friars were beheaded by the sultan himself on January 16, 1220. These were the first Franciscan martyrs. When Francis heard of their deaths he exclaimed, "Now I can truly say that I have five Friars Minor!" Their relics were brought to Portugal where they prompted a young Augustinian canon to join the Franciscans and set off for Morocco the next year. That young man was Anthony of Padua. Proclaiming the gospel can be fatal, but that has not stopped many who even today risk their lives in many countries throughout the world. www.franciscanmedia.org

Exemplifying the sacrament of Baptism is the preacher John the Baptist. Through his teaching John challenged the crowds to turn away from sin and be baptized as a symbol of repentance. When John baptized Jesus in the Jordan River, the Holy Spirit descended as a dove, strengthening Jesus for his public ministry. The Holy Spirit comes to us too at our Baptism and again at Confirmation to empower us to live our faith. John challenged everyone to repent and make up for sinful behavior, and his words led others to Jesus, the Messiah. John's message included sharing what you have, being fair with one another, reaching out to the poor and vulnerable, and living a moral lifestyle. He was imprisoned and put to death for his preaching. What price are we willing to pay for living out our faith?

WHO/WHAT IS THE INFANT OF PRAGUE? As the Infant of Prague, Christ is presented as both king and child. Instead of the modest garments of a poor child, the Infant is dressed in a sumptuous gown of royalty. The original 19-inch wax sculpture was brought to Prague, Czechoslovakia, by a Spanish princess who bequeathed it to her daughter, Princess Polyxena. Giving the statue to a poor order of Carmelite monks, Polyxena promised, "As long as you will venerate this image you will not lack anything." The monks did well until the 1631 invasion by Sweden. The invaders threw the Infant on a trash heap where it was found seven years later, without its hands. The Carmelite Father Cyril was praying before the once-again revered statue when he heard the words, "Have pity on me and I will have pity on you. Give me my hands and I will give you peace." Due to the recent war, money was scarce, but a stranger had it restored. During an epidemic the Infant seemed responsible for several cures and in 1642 Baroness von Lipkowitz had a beautiful chapel built for the Infant. Today pilgrims can visit that same chapel to see the original Infant. Many people have a version of the statue in their homes and many in desperate situations utilize a novena to the Infant of Prague, whose feast day is January 14.
