SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. John Neumann

January 5 Memorial

John's dream to become a priest seemed hopeless because of a surplus of priests in his native Bohemia. To fulfill his vocation John sailed to America where priests were greatly needed and arrived in New York in June of 1836. The bishop of New York



was glad to ordain him and assigned him to a German-speaking parish in the "Niagara Area." It consisted of over 100 square miles of swampy primeval forest. John lived above a tavern in Williamsville and preached in churches without steeples or floors. He walked to visit the sick and celebrated Mass at kitchen tables for his 400 families. A log church (28' X 32') was built in Sheldon during his four years in WNY. His deteriorating health led him to join the Redemptorists where he was given much more responsibility. He became a US citizen in 1847 and was consecrated bishop of Philadelphia in 1852. Despite financial troubles, he built over 90 churches and organized the first diocesan Catholic school system, going from 2 to nearly 100 schools. But this short, immigrant, country priest never lost his humility. When someone suggested he change his rain-soaked shoes, he replied the only way he could was by switching each shoe to a different foot; he owned only one pair of shoes. John Neumann died January 5, 1860, only 48 years old. He was canonized in 1977, the first US man to be declared a saint. His incorrupt body lies in St. Peter the Apostle Church in Philadelphia. WHAT DO WE SEE IN CHURCH? The main body of the church, where the people sit, is called the nave. The nave is filled with pews and kneelers in most churches. You may find a missalette there, containing the readings and prayers used at Mass. The other main part of the church is called the sanctuary. It is the central place where the priests or other ministers perform their roles at Mass. You will see in the sanctuary the place from which Scripture is read, called the ambo or lectern. The central furnishing in the sanctuary is the altar, where the priest celebrates the Eucharist. Ever since biblical times the altar has been referred to as "the table of the Lord (Mal 1:7, 12; 1 Cor 10:21). To show their reverence for the table of the Lord, people bow their heads when they pass in front of the altar. On the altar are vessels used during Mass, such as the ciborium, a plate or dish-like vessel, and the chalice, a goblet or cup-like vessel. These are made of precious material because they will hold the Body and Blood of Christ. The sacramentary is also on the altar; it contains the prayers used during Mass. On or near the altar is a crucifix, a reminder that Christ loved us so much that he died for us. The tabernacle is a vessel in which the Eucharist is kept for devotion or to be taken to the sick. To show respect for Jesus, people *genuflect* as they pass in front of the tabernacle.
